



**Parent conferences** are also quickly approaching. We will offer evening times on March 27 and afternoon times on March 28. Please look for communication from your child's teachers about scheduling a time to discuss your child's progress. **Traditional conferences will be held in preschool through grade 3. Grade 4 will be a hybrid this spring with a portion devoted to student reporting and a portion devoted to a traditional conference. Students in grades 5-8 will be holding student-led conferences.**

**On March 19**, beginning at 1:45 p.m., we will celebrate EES musicians with an in-school concert. The concert will feature preschool-grade 2 singers, grade 3 recorders, grades 4-8 band and our after-school chorus. All are welcome to attend this event!

Eastford students, along with all other Connecticut students in grades 3-8, will be taking the **Smarter Balanced test (SBAC)** and students in grades 5 and 8 will also be taking the **Next Generation Science test (NGSS)** beginning in late April. More information on specific dates will follow as we move closer to April. Prior to that, all students in grades 3-8 will take the NWEA computer adaptive assessments for reading, language, math, and science. Grade 2 students will take the NWEA assessment in May. The results of these assessments help us understand how your child is progressing toward meeting grade level standards and will help to inform appropriate instruction for your child.

We continue to accept both **preschool and kindergarten registrations for the 2025-2026 school year**. Students currently in preschool **do not** need to register for kindergarten, but please spread the word if you know others in town who are eligible to attend either preschool or kindergarten. Registration information is available on the school website. Click on the 'For Families' tab and then 'Forms.'

Please be aware that recent **Connecticut Legislation** has changed the **entry age cut-off date for kindergarten entry from January 1 to September 1**. This means that to be eligible for kindergarten a child must turn 5 years old by September 1 of the year they plan to enter kindergarten. If you have questions about your child's eligibility to enter kindergarten, please reach out to me so we can schedule a time to have this discussion.

**A special note** – the Eastford Board of Education has submitted the Education Budget for the 2025-2026 school year to the Board of Selectmen for review. The Town will post dates for the budget hearing and town vote on their website.

# Grade K News – Ms. Garvie

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This past month has been a very busy time in the Kindergarten class! We started the month with the 100<sup>th</sup> day of school and global school play day. Then we had our Eastford Public Library field trip and our Valentine Celebration.

For phonics, we have continued to learn how to read, spell, and write new “trick words”. We also practiced doing detailed re-telling’s of familiar stories. In math, we started our unit about addition and subtraction. Next, we will decompose and compose numbers within 10. Our science lessons included finishing up our unit on polar animals and during social studies time we learned about heroes for black history month! The children have also really enjoyed having the middle school children join our class for their community service hours.

# Grade 1 News – Mrs. Rhynhart

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Welcome to March! We will start out the month with a school-wide Read Across America Week – a week dedicated to celebrating books and reading. We will enjoy a special reading-themed activity each day as well as have themed dress-up days throughout the week. This month the first-grade scientists will be learning the science behind lights and sounds and how they can be used for communication. We will be making our own sound effects for a cartoon! We will also be watching for the changes in nature as winter turns to spring at the end of the month. The first-grade mathematicians will be learning how to add numbers to 100 and the first-grade authors will be writing an opinion story about their favorite book they have read by the author, Syd Hoff. Speaking of authors, we are looking forward to an online author talk with Joanna Ho on March 5. She is the author of, Eyes that Kiss in the Corners. Our social skills focus this month will be on recognizing our own feelings and learning how to calm our bodies when we have strong feelings. You may hear a first grader talking about “smelling the soup and blowing on the soup” as a way to breathe slowly and calm those strong feelings before we react. Stay calm and “March” on!





# Grade 2 News – Mrs. Crocker-Lincoln

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What is strong enough to make a canyon? This is just one of the questions grade 2 scientists are exploring in their *Work of Water Unit*. In this hands-on activity, students generate their own hypothesis and then investigate the causes of canyons. As you can see, students constructed cornmeal canyons. The second graders dripped water over their “land” to observe how water can change the shape of the land over long periods of time, and result in a canyon being made. Students collected data on how four different “rainstorms” changed their land. Fun was had by all and everyone in grade 2 was excited when Mrs. Mead saw science happening in grade 2 and visited with us!

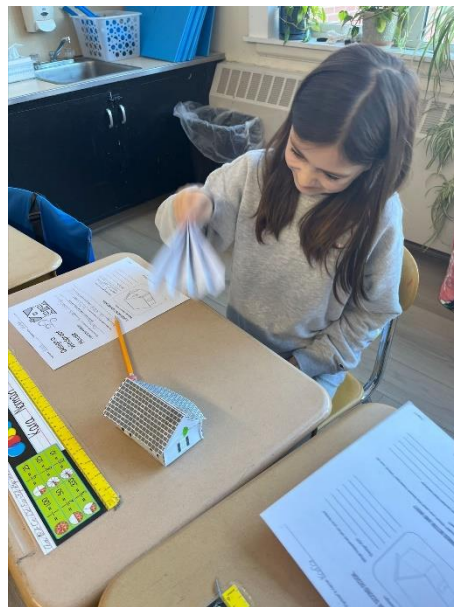




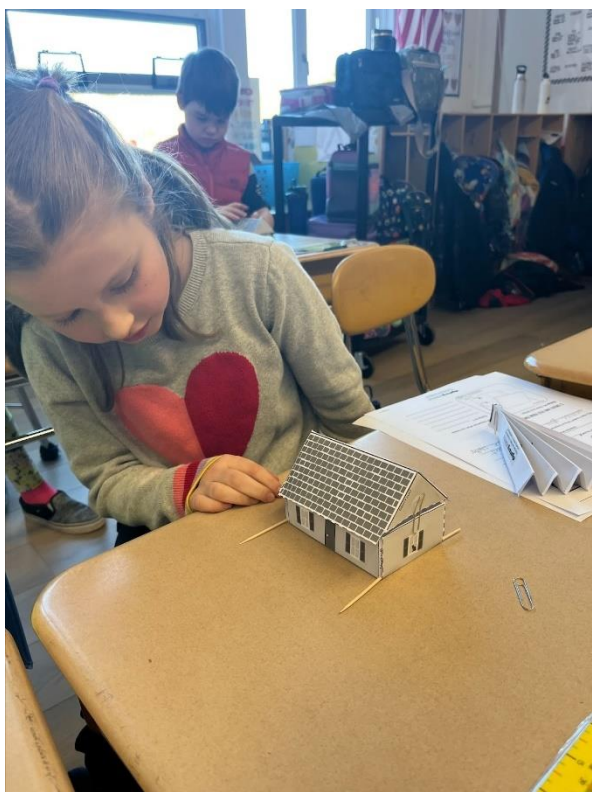
# Grade 3 News – Mrs. Bisson

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Third graders spent January and February learning all about weather and climate. To conclude the unit, grade 3 Scientists were “hired” as construction engineers to design a house strong enough to withstand a windstorm. Using the design and engineering process, students designed a house, tested their designs against a windstorm, improved their designs with additional materials, tested their new and improved designs, and reflected on their work. Third graders considered many factors while moving through the process: wind speed, use of materials, time spent on the project, and number of materials used. At first, some houses lost their roofs and homes flew off of desks, but by the end, some designs made it so that the homes didn’t move at all!







# Grade 4 News – Ms. Dill

Every month, grade 4 students take a walking trip to the Eastford Public Library. Miss Jennifer and Mrs. Ball help develop a lifelong appreciation for books and make a habit of reading. They encourage curiosity and a passion for knowledge. Librarians, Mrs. Bibeault and Mrs. Boyd, also play a crucial role in supporting students' educational journeys using materials from the Eastford School Library and libraries from around the state! They provide students access to necessary resources; public libraries offer a vast array of books, magazines, and digital resources that students can use for research, homework, and personal interests. In fact, Mrs. Bibeault notes that grade 4 students have 108 books signed out at this time! Libraries are vital to students as they offer essential resources, support academic success, and foster a love for learning in a community-oriented environment.

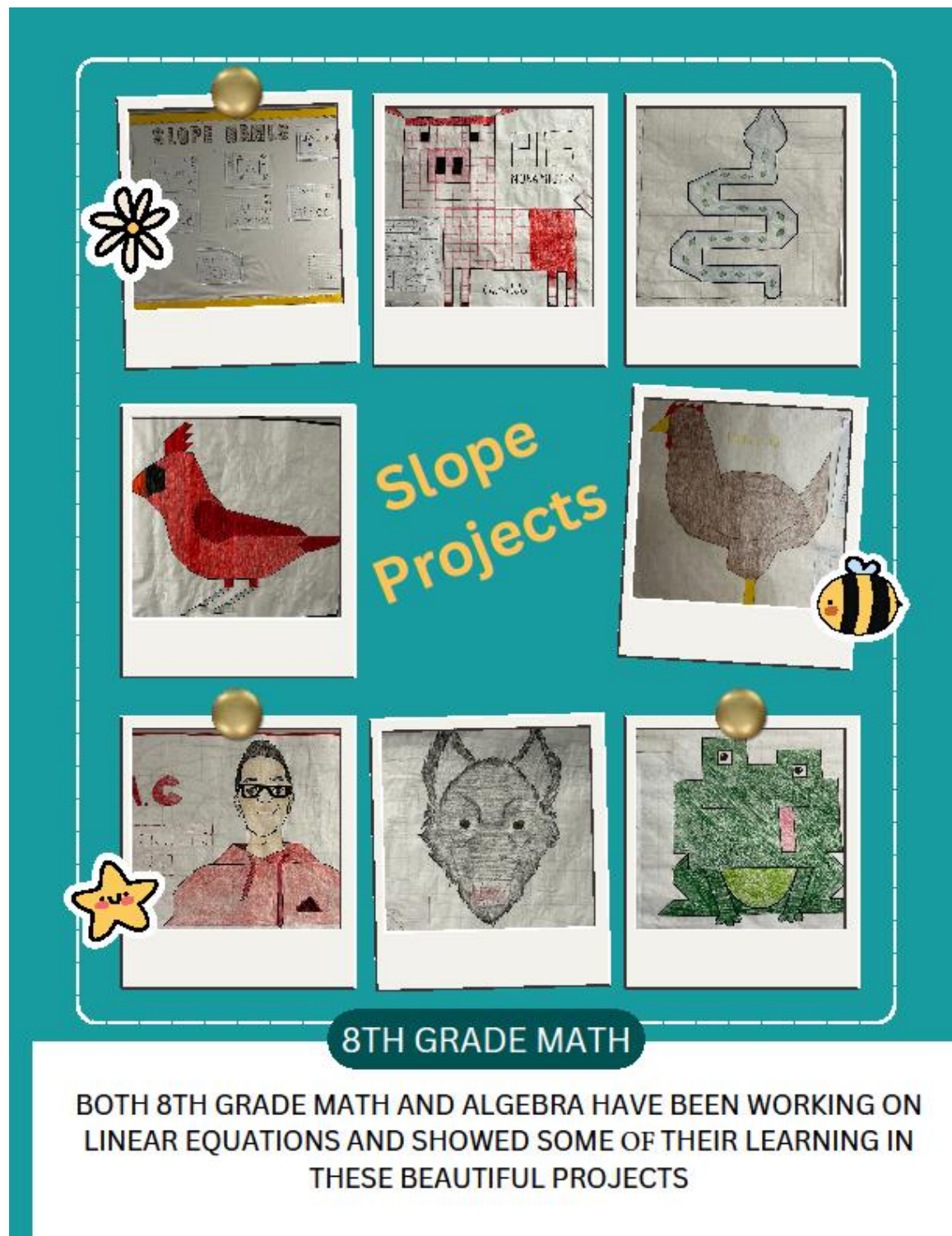

# Science News – Mrs. Mead

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Grade 5 students are wrapping up a Mystery Science unit about water on earth. The engineering challenge was to design ways to keep a coastal village safe from the hazards of rising surf. Students investigated using levees, raising structures, building seawalls, and using plants to reduce damage from waves. The next unit will be an introduction to chemistry

Grade 6 students are finishing a unit in which they revisited chemistry. They have created chemical reactions, learned about conservation of matter, and identified chemical changes to matter. Their next unit will investigate how human activities have changed our environment.

Grade 7 students have finished an earth science unit on earth's structure and energy sources: renewable, non-renewable and alternative. Now they are switching gears to a life science unit on how cells function.

Grade 8 students are discovering reasons for changing climates on earth. Here, they are using what they know about factors that increase temperature to design and build a prototype for a greenhouse that will raise the temperature the most in the least amount of time.



# Social Studies News – Mr. Kernan

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## **Grade 5: Exploring the Foundations of America**

Grade five students have wrapped up their study of the American Revolution, learning about key figures like George Washington and pivotal battles such as Saratoga and Yorktown. Now, they are diving into the U.S. Constitution and the Bill of Rights, exploring the fundamental principles that shape our nation. This is a basic understanding of our rights. It may be fun to ask them what they have found most interesting about this unit.

## **Grades 6 & 7: Journey Through the Medieval Ages**

Students in grades six and seven have been delving into the Medieval Ages, focusing on the Franks and influential leaders like King Clovis, Charles Martel, and Charlemagne. They've examined how geography played a crucial role in the Frankish victory at the Battle of Tours in 732 CE and explored the lives of medieval queens such as Brunhilda and Galswintha. This has been an engaging unit because, as with any learning about this time period, there's a certain amount of exaggeration about the events. It is then our job to dig into those stories and determine what may be true and what may have been exaggerated.

## **Grade 8: Understanding the Foundations of Government**

Grade eight has been studying the Articles of Confederation and the U.S. Constitution, taking a deep dive into the document's purpose and the rights it guarantees to all Americans. Through thoughtful discussions and analysis, they are gaining a strong understanding of the foundation of our government. This is a more detailed look at our governing documents than what grade five students examine. Students are asked to give real-world examples as well as think about how they may use our rights and responsibilities on a daily, perhaps weekly, occurrence.

**Grades K-2** In our physical education classes, students in grades K-2 have been actively developing their **throwing and kicking skills**. We've been focusing on proper technique, coordination, and control to help build a strong foundation for future physical activities and sports.



Through engaging games and activities, students are learning how to:

- ✓ **Throw** with accuracy and power
- ✓ **Catch** with confidence
- ✓ **Kick** with control and aim

Encouraging your child to practice these skills at home can be a great way to reinforce their learning! Simple activities like playing catch, kicking a ball back and forth, or even rolling a ball to improve coordination can make a big difference.

When not throwing and kicking, Students have been staying active with chase-and-flee tag games, which help improve agility, spatial awareness, and decision-making skills.

### Grades 3-8

I'm excited to share that students in **grades 3-8** have started our **volleyball unit**, which will continue through March! During this unit, students will learn and refine key volleyball skills, including:

- 🏐 **Serving** – Underhand and overhand techniques
- 🏐 **Passing** – Bumping and setting for teamwork
- 🏐 **Hitting** – Spiking and controlling the ball
- 🏐 **Game Strategies** – Positioning, teamwork, and communication



Through drills, skill-building activities, and modified games, students will develop their coordination, teamwork, and sportsmanship. This unit is a great way to stay active while learning an exciting lifelong sport!




